What is FRIdays?

FRIdays is a semi-annual news magazine published by the Ferguson Road Initiative (FRI), a grassroots community-based organization of neighborhood associations, Crime Watch groups, businesses, apartments, schools, the faith community, The City of Dallas, elected officials, and others. FRIdays is distributed to more than 16,000 single-family homes and 60 apartment complexes in White Rock Hills and Greater Casa View.

In 1998, FRI was launched as a 501(c)3 nonprofit, when community leaders in the lower Ferguson Road area united to proactively address the crime, urban blight, business degeneration, retail abandonment, poor DISD school performance, and diminishing property values plaguing our community. FRI extended their efforts into the 2-Points community in 2006. In 2009, we joined with the Greater Casa View Committee to include the upper Ferguson Road community.

A New Vision for Garland Road

In 2006, then Dallas City Council member Gary Griffith formed the Garland Road Vision Advisory Committee (GRV) to plan for the future of the Garland Road Corridor from I-635 to the intersection of Garland, Gaston and East Grand Avenues. This project is a Small Area Action Plan under *forwardDallas!*, an initiative approved by the Dallas City Council as the model for future growth of our city. The GRV Advisory Committee is made up of individuals who represent neighborhoods and individual stakeholders who will oversee the urban planning study of the Garland Road Corridor. Once the study is complete and adopted by the City of Dallas, it should improve the opportunity for various projects to be funded by future bond programs or private funding.

It is very important to note – no set agenda or vision has been predetermined. Rather, the GRV Advisory Committee is committed to steering a process in which the wishes of the communities of Garland Road are sought, focused, and implemented as part of the planning process.

The study is focused on three fundamental areas:

- Land use and development
- Mobility (vehicular and pedestrian)
- Beautification

All points of view have been sought through town hall meetings and written responses to a questionnaire. There were five public meetings in 2009 and 2010.

The urban planning study will cost approximately \$150,000. Donations from individuals, companies, and neighborhood associations have provided more than \$30,000. In addition, the GRV has received a \$120,000 Regional Transportation Council Sustainable Development Program grant from the North Texas Council of Governments (COG).

The plan will not change any existing zoning, but will be used as a guide for the future.

2-Points Takes Shape

FRI 2-Points Weed & Seed Study Begins to Unfold

The planning process for an area study for the FRI 2-Points *Weed & Seed* area is underway. The purpose of the study is to plan for the future by identifying the issues confronting the community and to recommend solutions.



The planning process is based on guidelines from the City of Dallas. Acceptable area plans may be submitted to the City for amendment to the comprehensive plan, *forwardDallas!* Such a plan will then be considered when a zoning case or development proposed within the study area is reviewed and considered by staff, the City Plan Commission and the City Council. The area plan also provides an opportunity to identify potential infrastructure projects which can be funded by bonds.

An advisory committee will meet six to eight times, followed by one or two public meetings. In an inclusive process, the committee will focus on neighborhoods, commercial areas, public safety, economic development and transportation. Five of these meeting have already occurred. At the first meeting, attendees were asked to identify strengths, weakness, opportunities and threats in the study area and to show these on maps. The second meeting discussed the results of compiling and summarizing the comments from the maps. Future meetings will identify the goals, strategies and actions of each section of the plan. The meetings are open to all interested parties. The resulting plan will be divided into the following five sections. Each section will work in tandem with others in that the issues often can be approached from several angles:

Introduction and Overview describes the community today, the area boundaries, population and residences and commercial interests forming a basis for the study.

Land Use Reviews describes current land uses and current zoning. Disparities between the two will be identified. Recommendations may be made that could potentially lead to rezoning or additional land use considerations.

Transportation will reflect all aspects of transportation issues, from streets and sidewalks to transit and trails. A pedestrian-friendly environment around and to schools and retail areas will be a critical component of this section.

Quality of Life will include education, additional code compliance and enforcement, and additional police patrols.

Economic Development will outline a long-range approach to area retail and commercial improvements.

The FRI 2-Points *Weed & Seed* Area Land Use Study has the support of City Councilmember Carolyn R. Davis and is facilitated under the auspices of the Ferguson Road Initiative by area resident Ann Bagley, AICP and Gail Washington, FRI Crime and Gang Prevention Specialist. ■

Editor's Note: The study follows the model used in 1998 with the City of Dallas Urban Design Land Use Study conducted for lower Ferguson Road. This study became a guide to identifying large scale community improvement projects, such as the \$3.7M rebuilding of Highland Road from Ferguson to Jim Miller that was placed on the City Bond program in 1998, approved by voters, and completed in 2005.

FRI Pursues Recreation Center

The Ferguson Road Initiative is making great strides to secure a recreation center near the intersection of Ferguson and Highland Roads for the people in White Rock Hills. Over \$5M in bond funds is secured to help pay for the center. This would fund a typical 20,000 sq. ft. recreation center – but FRI wants more than that! We are pursuing two avenues to expand the scope of the facility into one that serves multiple generations with meeting rooms, health and fitness programs that include swimming, track, workout rooms, and more.

Plan A is to seek \$8M in the next City Bond Program, to increase the size and programs. That would give us \$13M to expand the facility.

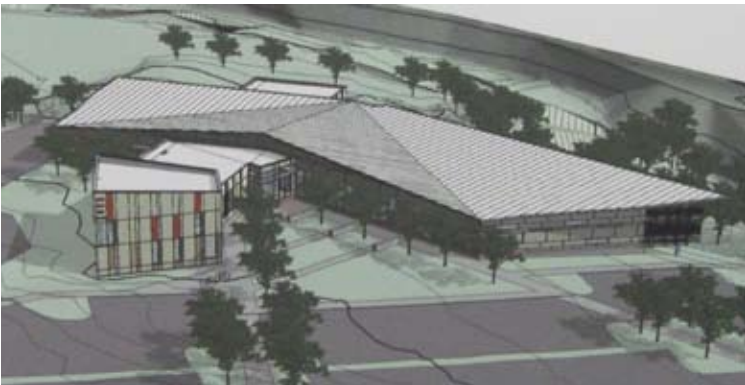
Plan B is to partner with an agency that provides grants to build 60,000 sq. ft. super recreation centers for underserved communities! We are meeting with an agency, which would like to remain anonymous for now, who does just that. We have made a presentation to them in partnership with the City of Dallas Park and Recreation Department. They have toured our community, and are very impressed with our track record of success. They think we are a great match for the program and really love the site that we have selected! It will take a year or so to go through this agency and get to a final decision. We will keep you informed.

If FRI is able to procure a privately-funded recreation center, the current \$5M in municipal bond money could be used to accelerate the implementation of the Ash Creek Trail by about 5 years. The Ash Creek Trail is a hike-and-bike trail from the White Rock spillway area to St. Francis Park! The recreation center would be a major trail head where folks could enter the trail. It would be very similar to the popular Katy Trail in the Uptown area of Dallas.

It's Going to Be a Knockout

The anticipated groundbreaking for the 18,000 sq. ft. White Rock Hills Branch Library has been moved from this summer to the fall with an anticipated grand opening in 2012. Delays surrounding the survey process slowed the design phase, but Director of Libraries Laurie Evans exclaimed the library is "going to be a knockout on a beautiful site!"

At the April 2010 FRI Steering Committee meeting, David Darnell, Internal Operations Manager for the Dallas Library DEPARTMENT, provided conceptual drawings of the library. Located along the South Fork of Ash Creek directly behind White Rock Church of Christ, Darnell likened the building to a tree house from which patrons could enjoy the creek through a glass wall. The courtyard area will tie-in with the limestone components of the 2005 Jacobs Streetscape Plan for Ferguson Road. The building will use Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) principles for safety and will environmentally sensitive. The facility must be certified to Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver level, but the City is working to meet the higher Gold level.

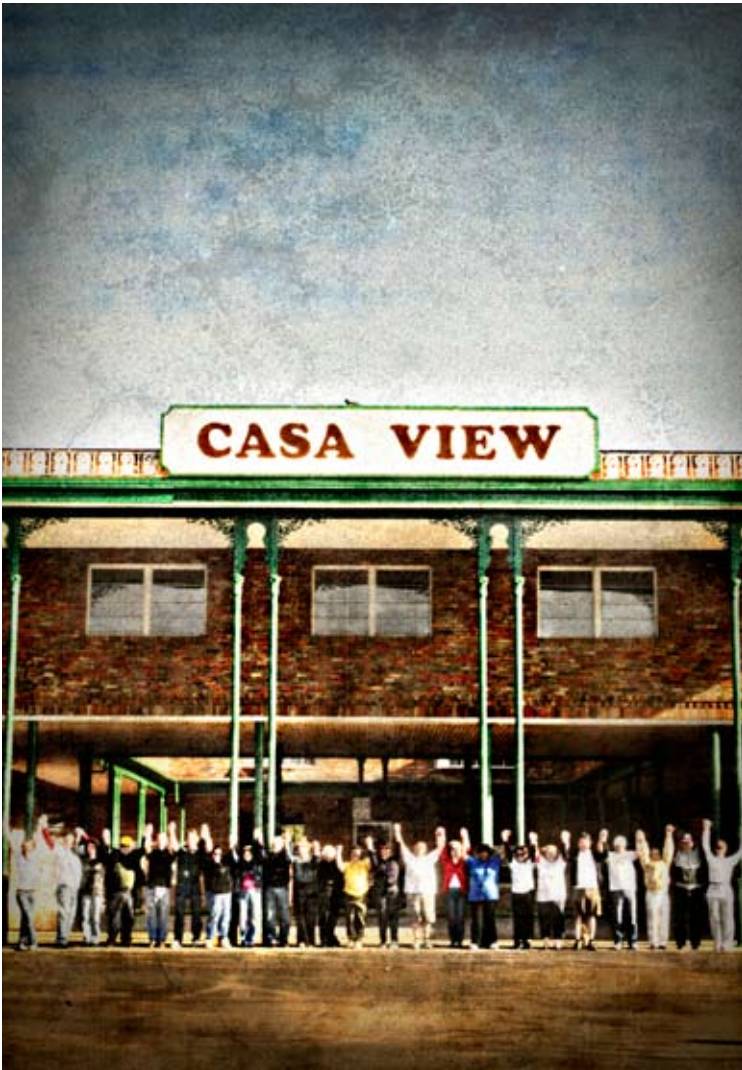
It's all about seeing the big picture, and wanting to be part of the solution. Earlier this year, more than 15 neighborhood groups and Crime Watches in the upper Ferguson Road Corridor came together and formally joined FRI. This means that there are now three major community clusters that form the FRI service area: White Rock Hills, which straddles Ferguson Road from I-30 to Buckner, and includes the Graduated and 2-Points *Weed & Seed* areas; Forest Hills/Casa Linda, which extends west of Ferguson Road to Garland Road; and now this new, very large area known as Greater Casa View. Greater Casa View, or GCV, extends along both sides of Ferguson from Buckner Boulevard all the way to LBJ Freeway. (See the map on the back cover.)

"The residents of GCV are extremely excited about teaming with the Ferguson Road Initiative. Not only has FRI inspired us to unite, but also has encouraged us to make a real difference by becoming actively involved to work for economic redevelopment, enhance our community, and reduce crime. FRI is rising, and we're proud to be rising with them," says Braeburn Glen neighborhood leader Lee Barron.

A MESSAGE FROM THE GREATER CASA VIEW COMMITTEE

To make this happen, we need your help. This addition of the Greater Casa View area means that FRI's service area has almost doubled, and its service population has grown from 40,000 to more than 70,000. FRI is busy exploring other potential Federal grants that will support crime fighting and neighborhood restoration programs for this entire population.

Community leaders in this new expanded area are getting involved, learning about FRI and using FRI as a tool to improve their communities. "What sets FRI apart from other neighborhood organizations is the leadership training and mentoring we provide for communities. In short, we unite neighborhoods by teaching them how to build consensus around issues," says Vikki Martin, FRI Board President.

The ball really got rolling last year. Residents of both the upper and lower portions of Ferguson Road started meeting informally in the winter of 2008, and a consensus had emerged that both areas shared similar interests and goals.

Residents of the upper Ferguson Road Corridor formed their own umbrella group, which they called the Greater Casa View committee,

to create a coalition of neighborhoods, businesses, schools, and faith communities to improve the upper Ferguson Road Corridor, just as the Ferguson Road Initiative originally coalesced to improve the lower Ferguson Road Corridor. By late spring 2009, GCV residents decided to meet and take formal action to join forces with FRI.

The first step was to hold a workshop meeting on June 29, 2009 at the Casa Emanu-El United Methodist Church. More than 100 attended, including representatives from seven GCV neighborhood groups and Crime Watches, FRI, the City of Dallas, Dallas Police Department, and DISD. After learning about FRI's mission, vision, goals, and key accomplishments, GCV residents met in small groups and identified the top five challenges and assets in their community.

In the fall of 2009, GCV neighborhood groups and Crime Watches met again at St. Pius X Catholic Church and voted unanimously to have the GCV community join FRI. In January, Mike Nurre was elected to the FRI Board of Directors to represent the GCV area.

Last February, GCV community leaders formed a committee, with Lee Barron as chair, to work with FRI to address their area's needs. The committee identified two immediate goals; reduced crime and the improvement of Harry Stone Recreation Center.

Boy Scouts Take on Graffiti

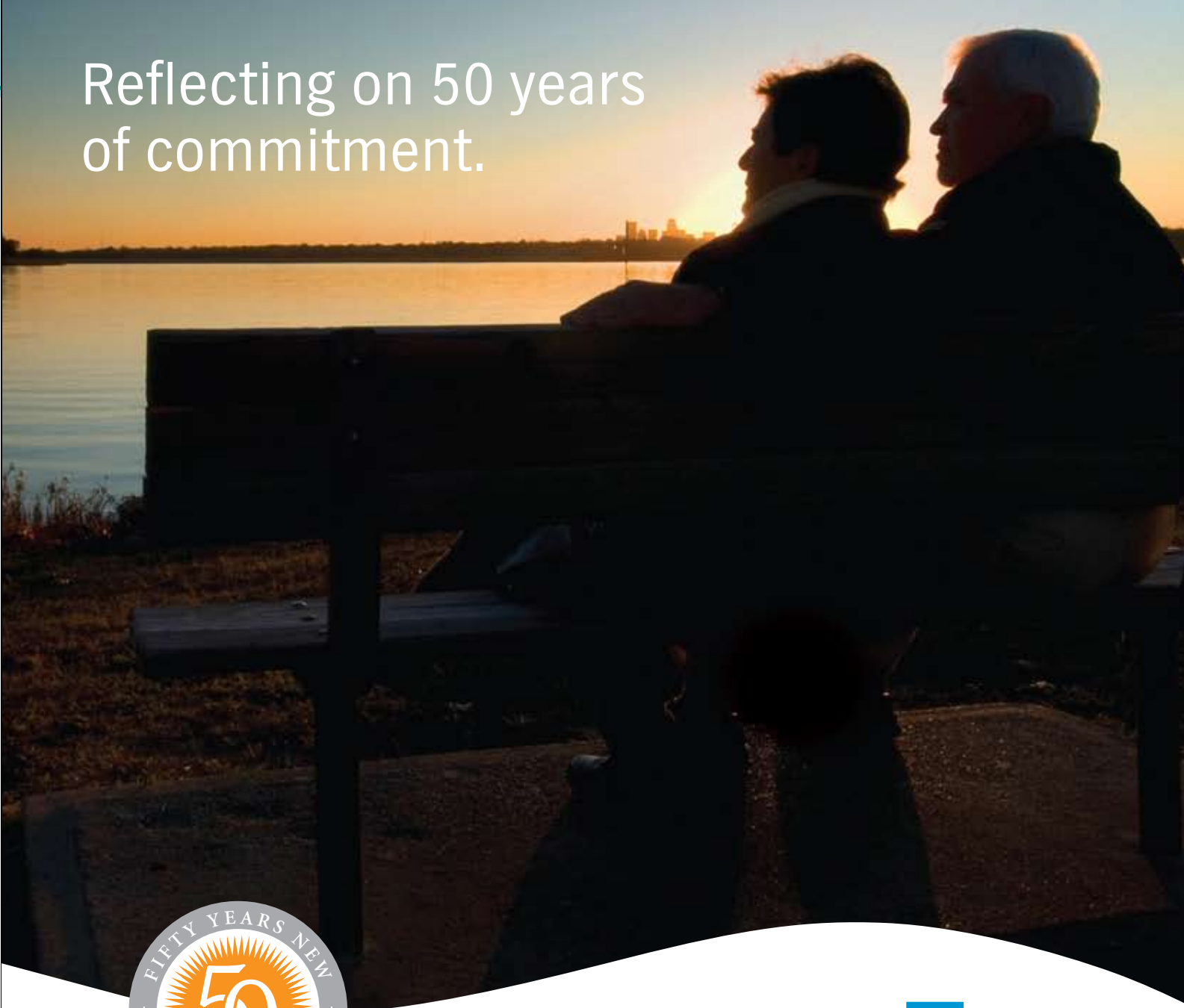

Crime is Down for the Count

FRI 2-Points *Weed & Seed* Report

As we wrap up our fourth year as an officially-recognized *Weed & Seed* community, our 2-Points community should be proud of our progress. Outlined below are some of our key accomplishments:

Crime Remains Down – For the second straight year, we had a reduction in crime in our community. Violent crime was down nearly 20% between 2008 and 2009. DPD reports continued improvement so far this year. Property crime is down nearly 6% between 2008 and 2009. Most dramatically, we had a 33.8% reduction in robbery of individuals and 29.4% reduction in burglary of individuals. This means we have seen 126 fewer of our neighbors become victims of serious crime. Thank you to our DPD partners and the many neighborhood Crime Watchers who assist them in making our community a safer place to live, work, worship and raise our families!

Sustaining Services Added – We all knew when *Weed & Seed* began that it wouldn't last forever. This coming year will be our last, and we understand that *Weed & Seed* is not part of the future for our funding agency, the United States Department of Justice (USDOJ). Because of the hard work of our neighborhood, many important functions have been sustained with non-federal funds. The addition last year of our Community Prosecutor, Daniel Ryan, and our Code Enforcement Officer, Jose Ruiz, means that many of our traditional *Weed & Seed* functions are now covered under local funding and will continue beyond our *Weed & Seed* grant. The funding of our Victim's Outreach program means this area is receiving much-needed services for the foreseeable future. Thanks FRI management team!

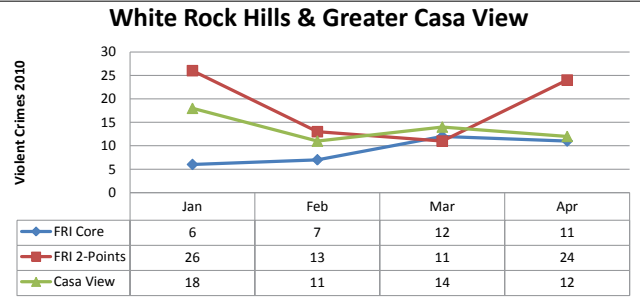
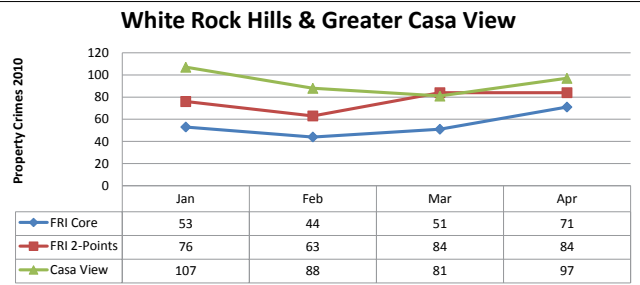
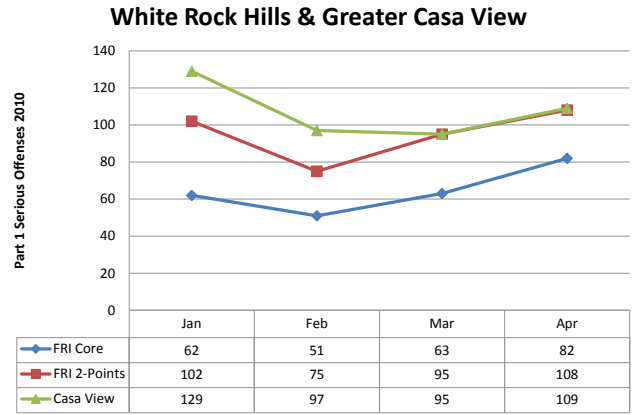
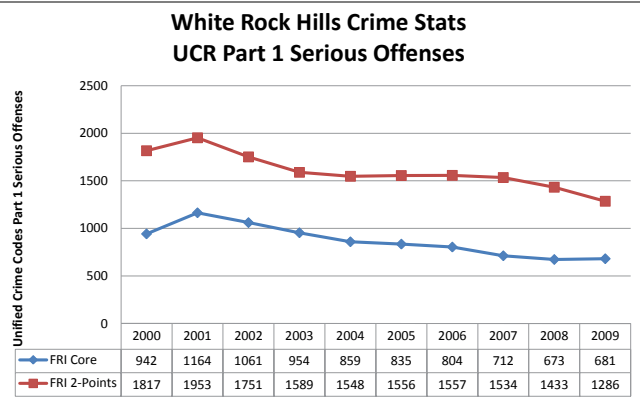
No Major Drug Actions – Sometimes no news is great news. For the first time since the 2-Points community began operations, we have had NO major drug initiatives in or adjacent to our neighborhoods. There were no million dollar seizures, no multi-agency arrests or perp walks, no stacks of drugs, guns and money... what a relief, what a great job and milestone. Thank you law enforcement team!

Earn It, Keep It, Save It (EKS) – Four years ago, as part of our initial *Weed & Seed* strategy, we launched our Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) initiative. The USDOJ helped us buy our first computers and IRS trained our volunteers. We served 108 taxpayers that year and we had provided assistance in returning \$147,064 to our stakeholders. With the ending of the 2009 tax season, our budding new partnerships with the Consumer Credit Counseling Service, United Way, Wachovia Bank, Girls Inc, University of Texas at Dallas and numerous groups around our community, we served more than 600 taxpayers and had refunds that exceeded \$1M. These services are further enhanced by providing family financial literacy training and credit counseling. Thank you EKS partners and the more than 50 volunteers now serving our community!



FRI Victim's Outreach Program

In 2009, when FRI saw a 171% rise in domestic violence murders in the 2-Points *Weed & Seed* area, FRI applied for a grant-funded position through the Office of the Attorney General. The goal of this program is to educate the community by partnering with agencies to address issues of domestic violence, sexual violence, assault, robbery, and child physical abuse. Through outreach, education, community training, and community awareness initiatives, this program is informing and educating victims of violence within the White Rock Hills and Greater Casa View community about available resources, and connecting them with the appropriate services.

Safety Net Program - The Safety Net Program was developed and piloted at S. S. Conner Elementary School in January 2010. This 12-week program provides insight and awareness to elementary and middle school students about bullying behaviors, child abuse, domestic violence, and school violence. The program deals with the impact of violence and abuse on self-esteem, and develops violence prevention strategies.

New Partnerships – To meet the needs of victims of violence and abuse, FRI has developed partnerships with several agencies.

EMPOWERING VICTIMS OF ALL AGES AND ETHNICITIES

Abuse and violence is a nationwide issue that impacts all ages and ethnicities. FRI's Victim's Outreach Program envisions a world in which every person lives in a safe environment, free from abuse and violence, and with the opportunity to thrive. FRI is dedicated to making this vision become a reality by developing strong partnerships and alliances with local community agencies, schools, churches, mental health agencies, social service organizations, apartment communities, Dallas police officers, and local political officials.

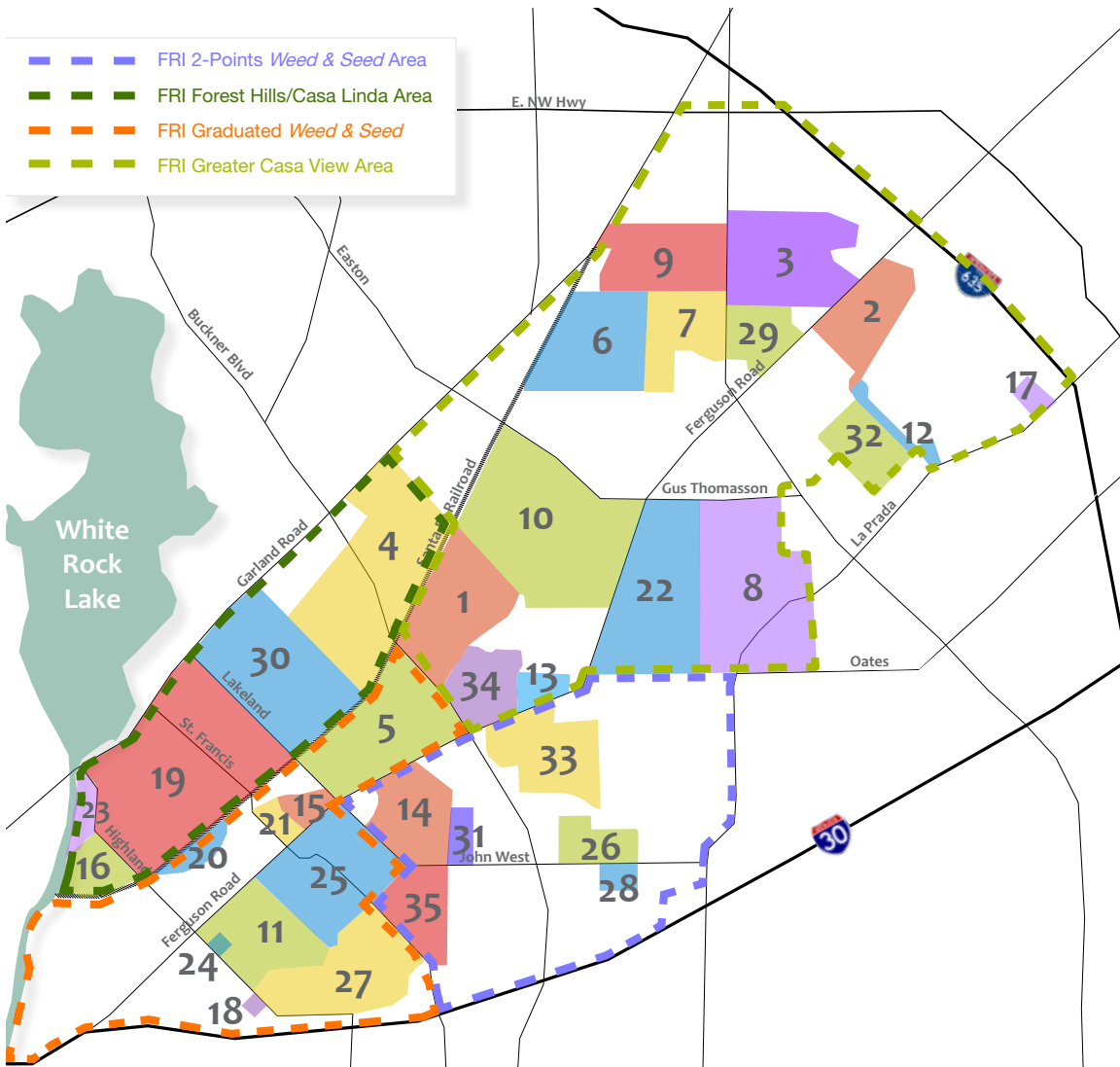
