

Building the Future of Far East Dallas

Letter from FRI Board President

In February 2025, I was honored to be elected President of the Ferguson Road Initiative (FRI) Board of Directors. I want to express my gratitude to Dan Ortman for his many years of dedicated leadership as Board President. Under his guidance, FRI executed strategic plans that brought us to this pivotal moment. Though Dan has stepped down as president, we are fortunate that he continues to serve as an active and valued board member.

This issue of FRIday's Magazine celebrates the power of community building. The foundation of Far East Dallas is not bricks, parks, or roads—it's people. Neighbors who give their time, talent, and passion because they believe in FRI's vision: Far East Dallas is strong and vital.

Our history proves what happens when a community comes together. In 1998, after the tragic death of a child walking to Bayles Elementary School, FRI led a grassroots campaign that secured \$3.5 million in bond funding to rebuild a dangerous street, Highland Road (from Ferguson to Jim Miller Roads). More than 1,200 parents, apartment residents, homeowners, churches, and businesses signed petitions and packed bond hearings—demanding

action and getting results.

That model—identify a need, communicate it clearly, unite partners, and mobilize residents—has made FRI one of Dallas's most effective community-building organizations. For nearly 3 decades, this approach has delivered transformative public amenities:

- 2012 –White Rock Hills Library opened
- 2021 White Rock Hills Park opened
- 2022 Highland Road reconstructed with bike lanes and sidewalks
- 2023 Trinity Forest Spine Trail and CreekSide Bike Park opened

This proven strategy led to two major victories in 2024-2025:

- 1.\$18.1 million in bond funding to design and build the White Rock Hills Recreation Center (scheduled to open in 2029). (see p. 5)
- 2. City Council approval of the Far East Dallas Public Improvement District (FEDPID), launching January 2026 to enhance safety, beautification, and economic vitality. (see p. 4)

FRI's results speak for themselves: 28 years of consistent leadership, community partnerships, and a clear vision for the future of Far East Dallas. But our work isn't finished.

On September 18, we invite you to join us for North Texas Giving Day. Your support fuels this mission—helping us build a stronger, safer, and more vibrant community for residents of Far East Dallas. Together, we are building the future.

Ferguson Road Initiative "See Something, Say Something" Campaign

The Ferguson Road Initiative has launched a community wide "See Something, Say Something" campaign to raise public awareness about how to report crime, terrorism, or suspicious activity to law enforcement. FRI's goal is to empower YOU to become proactive partners in crime prevention by reporting **suspicious activity**. It takes ALL of us to build a safer, stronger community! To report suspicious activity, call <u>214-671-4TIP</u> (214-671-4847) or use the iWatch app to upload photos, videos, audio recordings, and gps locations.

What to Include in Your Report:

- 1. Who or what you saw;
- 2. When you saw it;
- 3. Where it occurred; and
- 4. Why it's suspicious

If there is an emergency, call 911.



Key Details to Provide When Calling 911:

Location: Give the exact address. If unsure, describe nearby landmarks or intersections to help responders locate you quickly.

Nature of the Emergency: Clearly state what is happening—fire, medical issue, accident, crime in progress, etc.

Phone Number: Share the number you are calling from in case emergency responders need to call you back.

iWatchDallas is a community program to keep neighborhoods safe from crime and terrorism. It's designed to make reporting **suspicious activity** to the Dallas Police Department easy and direct, allowing for faster investigation and response times.

Police can communicate with app users in **real-time** (anonymous chat). You can send them additional info on a tip if the situation or location changes. They can ask you follow up questions if they need more details.



Send up to 5 photos regardless of resolution.



Make an audio recording to describe complex or dynamic situations



Send camera videos to police, or upload from your doorbell or home security cameras.





Send accurate gps coordinates to police in a tip or in chat. GPS can be disabled.



Police can send informational and emergency alerts to users with the location of incident.



Spanishspeaking users will see all app features and functions in their native language.

Say Something

Reporting SUSPICIOUS BEHAVIOR



When reporting suspicious behavior on iWatch, use specific, factual, and neutral language. Avoid guessing motives—stick to what you see, hear, and observe.

Use Key Words When:

Describing Behavior

- Disturbance/fighting
- Acting nervous/pacing/looking around frequently
- Attempting to open doors/checking car handles
- Loitering in the area for ___ minutes
- Following people/approaching multiple houses
- Taking photos or videos of ___ (unusual target)

Describing People

- Male/female, approximate age/height
- Wearing (color) (clothing item/shoes)
- Distinctive features: tattoos, scars, limp, etc.
- Carrying ___ (bag, backpack, tool, etc.)

Describing Vehicles

- Make/model/color/license plate (even partial)
- Parked in an unusual location/circling repeatedly/ time & location
- Occurred at (exact location) around (time)

Have you ever heard of the catch phrase, "See something, Say something?" In 2021, the Dallas Police Department implemented a nationally acclaimed Violent Crime Reduction Plan. This plan is derived from crime statistics. This data provides critical insight that guides decision making at every level. It dictates how we allocate our resources and ensure public safety.

When data is reliable and timely, it allows us to identify crime patterns, deploy officers effectively, and respond to emerging threats with precision. Moreover, accurate data fosters transparency and accountability. When the Dallas Police Department tracks and publishes crime statistics, it builds trust and ensures our actions are subject to oversight. Ultimately, accurate data is not just a tool; it is the backbone of fair, effective, and informed law enforcement in today's complex society.

It's very important that we continue to partner with our communities, stakeholders, and businesses to maximize our success with decreasing crime. We cannot do this alone. Call 911 or use the iWatch app if you see a crime being committed. If you think a crime is being committed, call 911 or report on the IWatch app. If you think something is not right, call 911 or report on the iWatch. We need to hear from you to truly make a difference in the neighborhoods that you live in.

FEDPID Approved: A Game-Changer for Safer, Stronger Far East Dallas

Far East Dallas is entering a new chapter of community-led revitalization. On May 28, 2025, the Dallas City Council unanimously approved the creation of the Far East Dallas Public Improvement District (FEDPID). IThis effort to establish

the FEDPID was led by the Ferguson Road Initiative (FRI) with strong support from Councilmembers Adam Bazaldua (District 7) and Jesse Moreno (District 2).


What is A Public Improvement District (PID) and what does it mean to me? A PID is formed at the request of business, apartment, and commercial property owners through a petition process. Owners agree to a supplemental assessment—distinct from a tax—added to their property tax bill. The funds are reinvested directly into the district, providing enhanced services beyond what the City typically offers. Local

homeowners will be the residual beneficiaries from the PID, they will not be assessed. FEDPID will serve 235 businesses and 30 multi-family properties in the White Rock Hills and White Rock East neighborhoods. However, Its reach extends to 18 residential neighborhoods, 10 churches, and 7 schools, creating safer, cleaner, and more vibrant surroundings that encourage community pride and economic growth along the Ferguson Road and Buckner Boulevard corridors. Planned services include extended neighborhood patrols, marketing and business promotion, and potential upgrades to key community assets such as the White Rock Hills Library and the Trinity Forest Spine Trail.

Launching in January 2026, FEDPID is projected to generate more than \$500,000 in its first year, with revenue increasing annually over its initial seven-year term. FRI envisions this as a sustainable funding model that could be replicated in other areas like Casa Linda and Casa View.

The approval of FEDPID is more than a policy decision it's proof of what grassroots advocacy and determined leadership can achieve for Far East Dallas.

CREEKSIDE: Building a Recreation Mecca Along Ash Creek

Dallas is on the brink of a transformative leap in community recreation, thanks to FRI's bold initiative and the major boost from the 2024 bond election. With \$18.1 million secured, the long-envisioned White Rock Hills Recreation Center (CENTER) is set to rise by 2029, anchoring a vibrant corridor of parks and trails stretching from St. Francis Drive to Samuell Boulevard.

Nestled at 2131–2165 Highland Road, the CENTER will be more than just a building—it will be a symbol

of connectivity, wellness, and community pride. Designed to serve the diverse residents of Far East Dallas, the CENTER will be the centerpiece of a growing network of green spaces and trails that follow the natural contours of Ash Creek.

The next milestone in this ambitious project is the selection of a construction firm by the Dallas Park and Recreation Department.

This firm will lead a design charrette in fall 2025. A design charrette is a hands-on, collaborative workshop where residents will help shape the CENTER's design and programming. With a dramatic 40-foot topographical drop at the site, the challenge is clear: create an iconic, accessible space that harmonizes with the surrounding mixed-income housing.

FRI and the City of Dallas are committed to ensuring that the CENTER reflects the needs and dreams of the community. Additional outreach meetings are scheduled for early 2026 to finalize plans and build consensus. The CENTER is not just a facility—it's a promise of inclusive growth, environmental stewardship, and neighborhood revitalization. As the vision for Creekside takes shape, Ash Creek is poised to become a destination for recreation, connection, and community spirit.

FRI believes that mixed-income housing is a cornerstone of healthy, thriving communities. It promotes social and economic mobility, reduces concentrated poverty, and fosters neighborhoods that are diverse,

inclusive, and safe.

Mixed-income workforce housing developments offer residents access to better schools, services, and job opportunities. They create communities where people from different backgrounds can live, work, and grow together.

FRI is cautious about new multi-family zoning. While we support housing that serves a range of incomes, FRI is generally opposed to new developments that require rezoning from single-family residence to multi-family. Far East Dallas has more than 50 apartment communities. Our focus is on expanding homeownership opportunities—particularly through single-family homes and townhomes—so that families can build equity, generational wealth, and long-term stability.

Community Benefits of Mixed-Income Housing:

Reduces concentrated poverty

- Integrates low-income residents into economically diverse neighborhoods, helping to break the cycle of poverty and promotes upward mobility
- **Builds resilient communities**
- Fosters stronger social networks, civic engagement, and neighborhood stability
- Promotes equity
- Helps ensure fairer access to quality schools, transportation, healthcare, and other essential services

These benefits are the reason FRI supports ownershipbased development. FRI actively collaborates with developers who share our vision . Here are a few recent projects where we've successfully advocated for alternatives to traditional multi-family developments:



In the heart of Far East Dallas, the Little Casa View Neighborhood Association is transforming its community through connection, service, and celebration. With a mission to make the neighborhood a great place to live, the Association embraces the diversity of its residents by offering a variety of ways to get involved.

Some neighbors enjoy social events, while others find fulfillment in service projects. Quarterly meetings at Harry Stone Recreation Center keep residents informed, while casual gatherings at local restaurants foster connection with each other and with city partners like Dallas Police and Code Compliance.

Recent service efforts include a collaborative mural painted on a graffiti-covered dumpster enclosure, biannual neighborhood cleanups, planting flowers along Gus Thomasson, and refreshing the staff break room at Reinhardt Elementary. An active Volunteers in Patrol group helps keep the neighborhood safe.

Family-friendly events are an essential part of the Association's success - from fire station visits and summer front yard socials to National Night Out and festive holiday celebrations. To celebrate community pride, the Association also recognizes neighbors with a Yard of the Month award from May through September.

In Little Casa View, residents are proving that a strong community begins with strong connections!

FRI: The Backbone of Community Change

Effective community building begins with a shared vision—whether reducing crime, eliminating urban blight, creating public spaces, or improving affordable housing. This vision drives the creation of community development infrastructure through a grassroots model that encourage resident

participation and collaboration, ensuring communities have ownership in their transformation.

Community development organizations implement this vision by assessing problems and needs, identifying barriers, and developing practical solutions. Done correctly, these activities create what theorists call collective impact: improved wealth, health, knowledge, and trust within communities.

FRI exemplifies this approach in Far East Dallas, serving as a backbone organization for participatory community development. Rather than creating isolated programs, FRI consults residents through town halls, develops comprehensive plans, and builds project coalitions of stakeholders including government, police, nonprofits, businesses, and civic organizations. As a backbone organization, FRI provides the connective tissue that holds together community development project coalitions and propels them forward.

FRI achieves this through strategic advocacy, communication with residents, facilitating stakeholder meetings, and coordinating sustained efforts until projects are realized. This backbone approach is rare because community development has historically been fragmented and isolated in impact.

Examples of FRI's hard work can be found throughout the community. The FRI *Weed and Seed* initiative (2000-2011) resulted in a significant reduction in crime. Important public amenities like the White Rock Hills Library was developed under FRI's leadership. FRI shepherded the White Rock Hills Park and the Trinity Forest Spine Trail which have provided essential recreational spaces. These are a few of the many project coalitions that FRI has developed in the community since its founding.

Backbone organizations like FRI demonstrate how sustained, coordinated community development truly moves the needle, creating lasting change through collaborative partnerships and resident-driven solutions.

Bayles Elementary Thrives Under New Principal

Since becoming Principal of Bayles Elementary, Mr. Miguel Campuzano has made a powerful impact on the school community. With a strong focus on academic achievement, family engagement, and campus improvement, he has introduced

several initiatives that reflect his commitment to student success.

One of his top priorities has been increasing parent and community involvement. In partnership with the Parent Engagement Department, Bayles now hosts academic workshops that provide families with tools to support learning at home.

Health and nutrition are also central to his vision. Through a partnership with Brighter Bites, Bayles families receive free fresh fruits and vegetables every two weeks-encouraging healthy habits at school and at home.

To strengthen community connections, Mr. Campuzano introduced two new events: the first annual Walk to School Day welcomed over 100 participants, promoting fitness and safe commuting. The inaugural Bayles Color Run brought together over 100 registrants from Bayles and the surrounding Claremont neighborhood, celebrating community spirit and togetherness.

Campus beautification has also been a key focus. Mr. Campuzano secured a \$27,000 grant from the Exchange Club of East Dallas and a \$3,210 donation from the White Rock Spring Games to upgrade important areas of the school, including the auditorium and redirection classrooms. These improvements are helping to create a more inspiring and welcoming space for students.

Under Mr. Campuzano's leadership, Bayles Elementary has grown into a vibrant, community-driven campus focused on student well-being, academic success, and strong partnerships with families. His leadership continues to inspire pride and progress throughout the Bayles community.

The Evolution of Lakeland Hills Park

Lakeland Hills Park, 2600 St. Francis Ave., an 8-acre neighborhood park in Far East Dallas, has transformed over five decades from a simple green space into a flourishing community hub.

Opened in 1974, the park offered basic amenities drinking fountains, picnic tables, and grills—a quiet spot for family gatherings. In 2000, a walking trail was added, attracting people of all ages, encouraging a healthier lifestyle.

In 2007, Lakeland Hills Park made history in Dallas by establishing the first skate park, creating a destination for youth. The park expanded with a pavilion, an updated playground, and new soccer and rugby fields in 2017.

The park's latest transformation in 2025 is the creation of a dog park. By transitioning an underutilized

baseball field, the dog park will include small and large paddocks, water fountains, shade structures, and benches. It will become a lively social space that strengthens neighborhood connections. Join the ribbon cutting celebration on October 18th.

Also part of recent improvements is the outdoor fitness equipment to promote wellness and 40 new trees to enhance the shade canopy.

Responding to growing demand, tennis courts are being upgraded to include pickleball. On the horizon, the skate park will include a \$1.5M expansion, making it a professional grade facility. Construction will begin in 2026 and be completed within 18 months.

A new playground is also planned to replace aging equipment.

From a modest neighborhood park to a multi-use recreational destination, Lakeland Hills Park's evolution tells a larger story: when public spaces grow with their community, they become more than parks—they become places where neighbors connect, families thrive, and safety flourishes.

Greening Dallas, One Pocket Park at a Time

Dallas is building a healthier future block by block. The new pocket park planned at Ruidosa Avenue & Cotillion Drive is part of the Trust for Public Land's (TPL) ambitious Dallas Greening Initiative—a plan to turn 15

underutilized city lots into neighborhood greenspaces that put a park within a 10-minute walk for more than 300,000 residents.

TPL and the City of Dallas began by mapping vacant, city-owned parcels in areas void of parks. Using GIS and ParkServe data, they identified 15 prime sites including the Ruidosa and Cotillion corner—as top priorities based on equity and access metrics. Funded through ARPA and philanthropic gifts totaling \$2.5 million, the pilot cohort of five parks is slated to break ground in summer 2025, with full build-out rolling out over five years.

On April 13, 2024, TPL and Better Block turned the empty lot into a vibrant "pop-up park." Tactical urbanism tools modular benches, planters, cornhole, chess, shade structures, and community tables—helped residents "test drive" different amenities. Feedback highlighted priorities: walking loops, seating, native planting, solar lighting, and safety features.

The Cotillion-Ruidosa park is a living experiment in equitable placemaking. Guided by data and community voice, it's set to deliver safe, accessible green space tailored to local needs.

Guided by community input and Studio Outside Landscape Architecture, plans for the future park will

feature:

- Looped walking path with benches and picnic tables
- Native garden beds to attract pollinators
- Solar lighting and security cameras
- Dog-waste and trash stations, signage, and flexible open lawn
- Modest pavilion or playground area, subject to final charrette decisions

Forgotten Cemetery Sparks Movement for Renewal

Tucked quietly behind St. Francis Avenue in East Dallas is Warren Ferris Cemetery—overlooked for decades, but now thriving with new life. This small plot contains the remains of Warren Angus Ferris, the first person to survey Dallas and a dedicated naturalist.

Although his name has faded from public awareness, his legacy lives on in the land he once mapped and cherished.

When I moved next door, the cemetery was overrunremaining headstones crumbling, native plants smothered by invasive species. What started as a simple cleanup became something far more meaningful. Neighbors joined in. Engelmann daisies returned. And slowly, the land began to heal. That shared effort inspired the Constellation of Living Memorials (CLM), a two-year pilot to test proof of concept for a growing movement that restores forgotten cemeteries as native habitats and community spaces. We've transformed Ferris Cemetery into a pilot site for environmental restoration, cultural preservation, and neighborhood engagement.

Today, five historic cemeteries have joined the constellation project. With support from the City of Dallas and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, each site reconnects with both nature and history, offering opportunities for master gardeners, naturalists, and youth outdoor experiential learning.

Across the street, Sanger Preparatory School is becoming a key partner. This fall, students will explore the cemetery's stories and ecology through our new CLM 4-H Leadership program.

Warren Ferris was a man of vision. By honoring his resting place, we carry forward that vision—turning forgotten ground into living memory. These sacred spaces are no longer just markers of loss, but symbols of life, resilience, and community.

Together, we're remembering what matters—and rooting that memory in native soil.


Nearly Complete: 2005 Intersection Upgrades in Far East Dallas

The 2005 improvements to two major intersections along Ferguson Road—at Lakeland Drive and Highland Road—are now nearing completion, bringing long-awaited upgrades to pedestrian safety and community identity in Far East Dallas.

With 95% of the sidewalk construction completed at Ferguson Road and Lakeland Drive and 80% of the sidewalk construction completed at Ferguson and Highland Roads, the intersections await the final component of the intersection design: 2 gateway markers at each intersection. These monuments are intended to symbolize the entrance into the White Rock Hills community and instill a stronger sense of identity, place, and pride for residents.

Gateway markers are planned for installation after 2026, once funding for the Far East Dallas Public Improvement District is secured and insurance is in place.
