That included management of Crime Watch/public safety activities, securing much needed social services and economic development initiatives in Far East Dallas. We work ardently to "weed out crime and seed in" the resources to improve the lives of people in Far East Dallas.

Our success results from partnerships with local, state, and federal government, neighborhood and Crime Watch groups, local businesses, foundations and faith communities. In addition, local schools and nonprofits are key partners reaching the community. Together we are mastering the art of utilizing the skills and talents of our volunteers and civic leaders and discovering entrepreneurial ways to reshape and restore our community!



SEVEN KEY INITIATIVES

In 2018 the Ferguson Road Initiative Board of Directors (BOD) updated the mission and vision statements to remain relevant to the work FRI does in Far East Dallas. The Board established Seven (7) Key Imperatives for 2018:

1. Elect a new board President and establish Executive Director position.

√ The BOD elected a new president (Nicole Miller) and hired a p/t executive director (Vikki Martin).

2. Increase Membership by 15%.

✓ Engage Neighborhood Leaders and Volunteers. *In 2018, FRI increased membership from 166 members in 2017 to 206 members in 2018, a 22% increase.*

3. Become the regional leader for the VITA & EITC Program.

- ✓ It has been determined that FRI does not have the capacity to fund, manage, and operate its own independent VITA site. Nor do we have the resources to train volunteers needed for such a program.
- ✓ However, FRI does have the ability to partner with other Tax Center sites and to help recruit tax preparers, greeters, and translator volunteers for the Far East Dallas site.
- ✓ Through a partnership with Eastfield College Pleasant Grove Campus, FRI participated in presenting family literacy series to students and their parents.

4. Complete the Community Park and Recreation Center.

- ✓ On December 1, 2018 the City of Dallas Park and Recreation Department broke ground on the White Rock Hills Park. This is a \$400,000 neighborhood park that will be Phase I of the White Rock Hills Community Recreation CENTER Project. The park will have 2 playgrounds, a pavilion, a ¼ mile loop trail, and a flexible athletic field.
- ✓ Once the park is completed, then Highland Road will be reconstructed from Ferguson Road to the Primrose Senior Housing Apartment and will include sidewalks on both sides of the road, storm sewers, improved lighting, and curbing.

✓ There will also be a bike path created from the WRH Park that will link-up to the Trinity Forest Spine Trail and the city-wide trail system, thus connecting our isolated neighborhoods to the rest of Dallas.

5. Help launch Owenwood Farm and Neighborhood Space (OFNS).

- ✓ FRI worked throughout the year with OFNS leadership to help solidify their mission, vision and values. We worked with the Dallas County Community College District who donated ½ day compression planning services that helped identify programs and partners.
- ✓ We also began work with La Piana Consulting services who is helping OFNS develop their governance model.

6. Develop a public safety initiative to train community leaders.

- ✓ FRI is partnering with Truett Crimewatch to begin a pilot quarterly program that will bring crime prevention and public safety services to the Far East Dallas area. The first program was held in September 2018.
- 7. Create an ad hoc committee to research the feasibility of becoming a PID, TIF or Neighborhood Empowerment Zone.
 - ✓ Our study indicates that a PID and TIF are not feasible currently for FRI. Our team who created this study recommended that the lower Ferguson Road corridor consider becoming a new City Neighborhood Empowerment Zone, like the Casa View community.
 - ✓ Further research led our Economic Development Committee to wait and see how this program works for the Casa View area before applying for consideration.



In December 2018 the City of Dallas Park Department broke ground on the White Rock Hills Park, Phase I of the future White Rock Hills Community Recreation CENTER.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



Together Everyone Achieves More!

FRI takes a holistic approach to community development. In order to advance Far East Dallas as a safe, beautiful, prosperous and proud community, we engage residents and businesses in activities that are important to them. Our seven programs offer volunteer opportunities for people of all ages and abilities.

PROGRAM: ADVOCACY

GOAL Develop partners to deliver programs and services that improve quality of life in Far East Dallas neighborhoods.

- 4 families received free A/C units through FRI's partnership with an anonymous family foundation, totaling \$1,285 in the form of an in-kind gift.
- 50 Far East Dallas students, 1-8 grades, were tutored through the New Horizons of North Texas program by 23 volunteers at Alex Sanger Elementary School, including 8 staff persons. FRI collaborated with New Horizons to communicate community service needs and to recruit reading tutors.
- 1,500 children and their families are served by the White Rock Hills Library, which opened in 2012 through FRI advocacy. The library reports to be one of the busiest in the city, hours were increased to 7-day a week service in January 2015 to address constituent need.



PROGRAM: COMMUNICATION

GOAL Communicate vital information regarding strategic progress and access to quality programs and/or services.

OUTCOMES

- 2,500 people received the 2 x per month FRI digital newsletter the FRI NewsFlash.
- 18,000 households received one edition of the FRIdays news magazine in Summer 2018.
 All 60 of our apartment complexes received magazines left in property office, mail and/or laundry rooms.
- FRI continues to update and refresh its Web site making it more "user friendly" and promoting and marketing our area businesses.
- FRI has a strong and strengthened presence on Facebook and Instagram.
- 37 neighborhoods Crime Watch and Volunteer In Patrol organizations served by semi-annual and special public safety programming meetings.
- Two (2) FRI Community Connection Townhall meetings held, averaging 80+ community leaders and residents.
- 37 neighborhoods received timely communications from the City of Dallas regarding City sponsored clean-up opportunities through the year.

PROGRAM: CONNECTION

GOAL Engage community advocates in opportunities to connect and improve the he community of neighborhoods in Far East Dallas.

- 6,414 hours of service were donated by more than 841 volunteers at a total value of \$154,833.96 to our neighborhoods and businesses in Far East Dallas.
- On March 3, 2018 over 200 volunteers met at Walgreens (Lakeland/Ferguson) to participate in Operation Beautification Litter Cleanup in Far East Dallas communities and parks.
 - This was underwritten by a partnership, (City Credit Union and Young Chevrolet), and sponsors [State Representative Eric Johnson (District 100), Councilmembers Kevin Felder (District 7) and Mark Clayton (District 9)] Friends include the Dallas Police Department, Elliott's Hardware, For the Love of the Lake, McDonald's, Ferguson Donut, Resource One Credit Union, and Signage Systems.
 - Volunteer participation representing 12 neighborhoods, 6 schools, 2 apartments, 10 businesses, 4 nonprofit service organizations, 3 faith communities and the White Rock Hills Library.
- In partnership with the Owenwood Farm & Neighbor Space a Senior Task Force conducted a study determining that communication and transportation are the top two needs of area senior citizens living in Districts 7 & 9 in the FRI community.



- \$8,000 in pro bono services provided by Dallas County Community College District for Compression Planning to identify components, programs and partners to be housed at the Owenwood Farm & Neighbor Space. Eight agencies participated.
- 175+ community members and supporters attended the Ferguson
 Road Initiative 20 Seasons of Love Anniversary Celebration
 Breakfast to commemorate 20 years of good work and service to
 the residents of Far East Dallas on November 10. Speakers included Mayor Mike Rawlings,
 Bishop Michael McKee, State Representative Eric Johnson, and civic leader Phil Ritter.
- 24 area businesses provided \$15,581.50 in advertising to underwrite the FRIday magazine.

PROGRAM: LEADERSHIP

GOAL Provide visionary leadership to the constituents of Far East Dallas and develop strong community leaders in every neighborhood.

OUTCOMES

- 206 FRI Community Connection members invested in FRI, thus sustaining operations and programs.
- \$33,009 was contributed by 139 investors during the annual North Texas Giving Day campaign. That is a 6.5% increase in contributions and a 14% increase in donors from 2017.
- 29 Founder's Circle Members made a 3-year pledge of support to FRI providing \$56,000 annually for 3 years. This helps establish an annual budget to support FRI operations.
- FRI promotes over 140 local businesses in the on-line business directory.
- FRI garnered over \$10,000 of pro bono professional consulting services

PROGRAM: CRIME & SAFETY

GOAL Educate and engage community leaders to increase public safety and decrease crime in Far East Dallas.

- Maintained a Database of FRI Community Leadership, Crime Watch/VIP & Public Safety organizations to educate leaders on crime trends and provide actionable information.
- 28 neighborhood leaders were trained to respond in a crisis, like an active shooter event, in a September pilot public safety program hosted by FRI and the Truett Area Crime Watch.
- With increased Crime Watch and Volunteer In Patrol programs, crime continues to decline, and FRI continues to seek funding for public safety initiatives.
- 55,000 people were educated with safety information regarding the National Air Bag Recall Initiative (AirBagRecall.com).
- The Dallas Police Department launched new crime reporting program, National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) an incident-based reporting system used by law



enforcement agencies in the United States for collecting and reporting data on crimes. Local, state and federal agencies generate NIBRS data from their records management systems. This new reporting process is more accurate and will serve as the new baseline measure for 2019.

PROGRAM: FINANCIAL LITERACY

GOAL Provide Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) services and financial literacy education to community residents.

OUTCOMES

- 1,492 families received free income tax assistance through our 2017 VITA program
- A combined total of \$2,774,796 in tax return money stayed in Far East Dallas.
- FRI has a 13-year track record of providing the VITA programs and services
- \$19 million in earned income tax credits have helped residents by helping them avoid predatory lending.
- 373 hours of free financial education was provided for VITA families



PROGRAM: ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

GOAL Advocate for compatible, quality economic development to revitalize Far East Dallas and facilitate new opportunities with partners and investors.

- \$400,000 White Rock Hills Park broke ground on December 1, 2018. The Park will begin to
 address the recreation gap that has existed along the lower Ferguson Road corridor in Far
 East Dallas, for over 30 years. The Park will serve more than 200 youths and their families in
 Far East Dallas.
- Site development begins with the acquisition and demolition of substandard apartments in preparation for the future White Rock Hills Community Recreation Center.














Over half of FRI's support comes from its members in the form of monthly support and annual gifts.




One-third of FRI's supports comes from contributions by public and private sources.




FRI is making a successful transition from a government service provider, thru Weed and Seed to an independent, membership organization!


There was a slight dip in assets in 2018, however, over the past six years FRI has seen steady growth.




At 3%, FRI is well under the accepted nonprofit standard debt to equity ratio of 30% or less.
