Working Together for the Greater Good

The Ferguson Road Initiative's (FRI) motto, *Working Together for the Greater Good*, is the theme for this year's Annual Report. Marking 21 years of service to the Far East Dallas community, FRI continues to advocate for and mobilize the community around large-scale amenities and projects that enhance the quality of life for all who live in this area of Dallas. Projects currently under construction, like the new White Rock Hills Park and the Casa View community's Harry Stone Family Aquatic Center, ensure that children and families living in Far East Dallas have the same safe access to recreation opportunities as do others living in other quadrants of our town.

By *working together for the greater good*, we keep our constituents informed through our extensive communication networks. By utilizing both traditional and social media platforms, we inform residents of our progress and this makes us accountable for the things we say we are going to do. Providing relevant information regarding area service organizations, agencies, and other opportunities helps families access the services they need to strengthen and promote families.

The connections of the Ferguson Road Initiative are vast. In addition to more than a dozen area nonprofits, FRI partnerships include a long-time relationship with the Dallas Police Department, the City of Dallas and the Dallas Park and Recreation Department. FRI supports health, housing, safety and financial wellness initiatives. Community relationships facilitated by FRI promote positive economic development, and FRI serves as the community "watchdog."

FRI is committed to building leadership within the Far East Dallas community. Identifying and coaching leaders throughout the area, FRI is the go-to organization, providing support in teaching folks how to solve their own problems.

With the election of a new president and the implementation of board best practices, FRI is confident that FRI leadership, staff, volunteers and supporters, will continue to make a difference in the lives of those living, working, and enjoying the natural environment in Far East Dallas. FRI remains committed to evolving our advocacy efforts and hope with your help and continued support we can ensure an ongoing thriving community for all.

Strategic Highlights

In early 2019 the Ferguson Road Initiative Board of Directors (BOD) committed to improving their policies and procedures. Board Committees created charters, met quarterly, and reported their progress to the Board on a regular basis. Attention was given to fundraising and board governance activities.

Financial Highlights

FRI has made the transition of being an organization relying primarily on federal funding (2000–2011) to a successful self-sustaining nonprofit organization (2012–now) based on community support. Our Founder's Circle Donor program (a 3-year financial pledge) aids us in our ability to set an annual budget because these are dollars we can count on. These funds, combined with our other membership levels, make up 80% of FRI's revenue, the remainder come from grants and contributions.

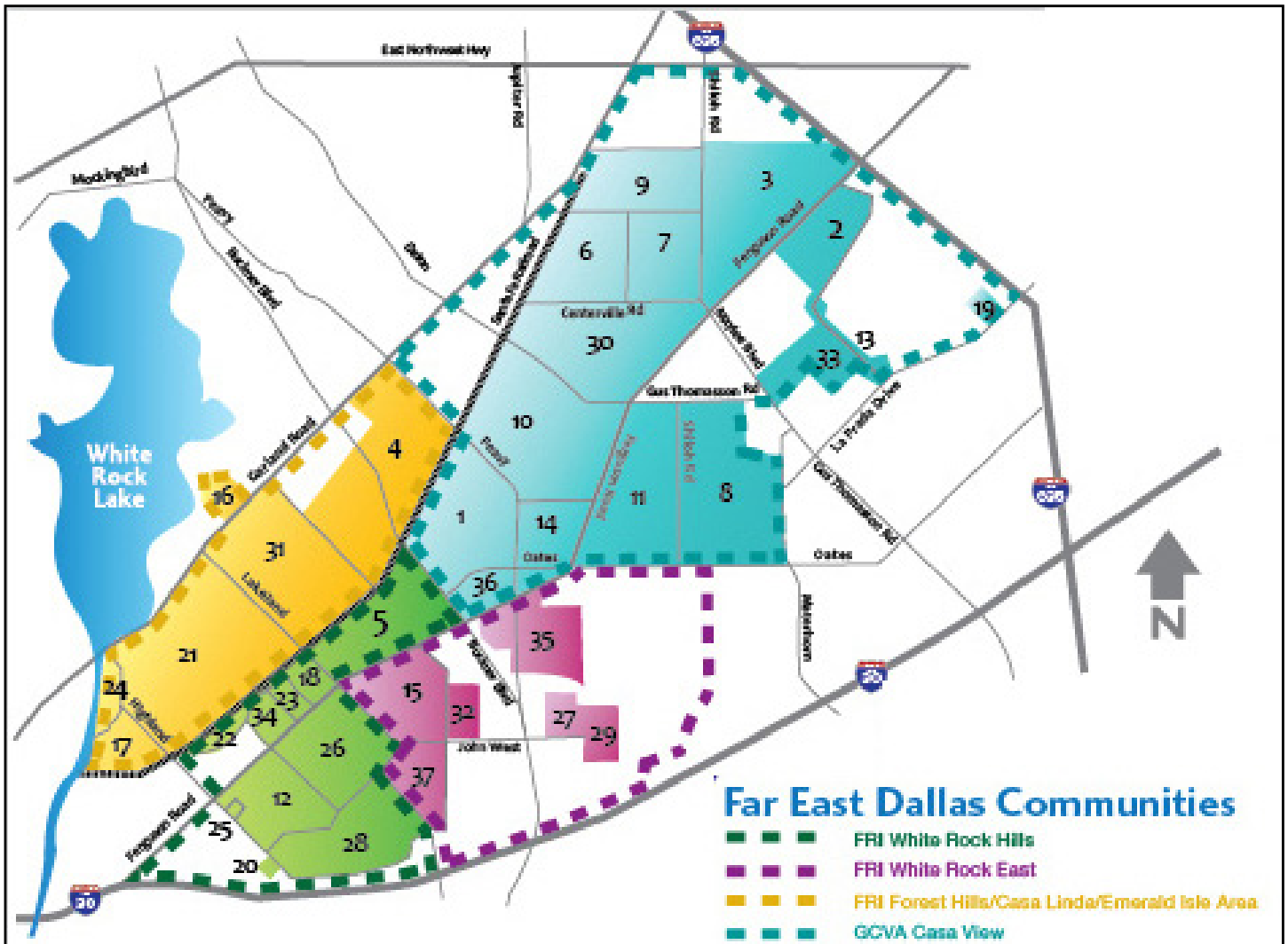

Together Everyone Achieves More!

FRI takes a holistic approach to community development. To advance Far East Dallas as a safe, beautiful, prosperous and proud community, we engage residents and businesses in activities that are important to them. Our seven programs offer volunteer opportunities for people of all ages and abilities.



Program Highlights

ADVOCACY

Goal

Develop partners to deliver programs and services that improve quality of life in Far East Dallas neighborhoods.

Outcomes

- FRI takes a holistic approach to community development. To advance Far East Dallas as a safe, beautiful, prosperous and proud community, we engage residents and businesses in activities that are important to them. Our seven programs offer volunteer opportunities for people of all ages and abilities.
- Over the summer, FRI facilitated a partnership with Bayles Elementary School and Reading Partners of North Texas, a literacy nonprofit organization. In school year 2019-20, mid-year assessments of 36 students showed an 80% increase in foundation literacy skills: alphabet principle, phonics, and vocabulary. FRI also helped recruit 28 tutors for this program.
- FRI was responsible for the advocacy and lobbying involved to get the White Rock Hills Library placed on city bond programs in 2003 and 2006. Opened in 2012, our library remains as one of the busiest in Dallas with 7-day-a-week service. 31,580 children and their families are served weekly by the White Rock Hills Library, representing an increase of more than 4,000% since 2017! 1,151 programs were offered serving 9,324 individuals. 278,769 books, videos, and other materials were checked out. Who says libraries are obsolete!
- FRI, in partnership with Mountain View Church of Christ, underwrote a Back-to-School backpack give-away drive and healthcare promotion serving 324 students from 18 schools in East Dallas. Information and services were also provided by Lone Star Credit Union (financial literacy services) and Mission East Dallas (health, dental, and behavioral services).
- The 2019 municipal election brought positive change to our community. We now have two councilmembers representing Districts 7 & 9 who are working together to help serve constituents and to move forward on the FRI vision to revitalize the lower Ferguson Road corridor and the Ash Creek Greenbelt.
- FRI advocacy helped secure a request from the Parks Department to conduct an Urban Land Use (ULI) Technical Assistance Panel (TAP) study of the Ash Creek Greenbelt. The “10-Minute Walk,” is a partnership of the Trust for Public Land, National Recreation and Park Association, and Urban Land Institute to advance the goal that everyone has a quality park within a 10-minute walk of home.
- The purpose of the ULI TAP study was to explore how the development of the Ash Creek Greenbelt, which includes the White Rock Hills Park, Trinity Forest Spine and Ash Creek Trails, reconstruction of Highland Road to improve connectivity, Highland/Ferguson Road intersection improvements, and the building of the future White Rock Hills Community Recreation Center will serve as a positive catalyst for economic development for this community. Over the course of the year, FRI worked with the Parks Department and ULI in planning the TAP study. ULI depended on FRI to help identify and connect key stakeholders who could provide input in developing ULI recommendations. FRI helped secure a location for the 2-day TAP study and provided important history to the TAP team as well as helping to conduct the tour of the area with the Park Department.

Program Highlights

LEADERSHIP

Goal

Provide visionary leadership to the constituents of Far East Dallas and develop strong community leaders in every neighborhood.

Outcomes

- 16 community members representing 8 neighborhoods received leadership training from RESULTS, a nonprofit organization specializing in training citizens to become more effective in engaging office holders who impact policy decisions regarding poverty. RESULTS generously provided 6 volunteers who worked one-on-one and in groups to train our community on how to interact with elected officials, pen an impactful letter, make a constituent phone call, how to form an elevator speech, and how to prepare for a face-to-face meeting with a public official. The provided information was easy to adapt for any community advocate and leader wanting to create change in their neighborhood.

- 347 FRI Community Connection members invested in FRI, thus sustaining operations and programs. This is a 68% increase from 2018.
- \$44,148 was contributed by 140 investors during the annual North Texas Giving Day campaign. This is a 33% increase in gifts from 2018!
- 37 Founder's Circle Members made a 3-year pledge of support to FRI providing \$62,000 annually for 3 years. This helps establish an annual budget to support FRI operations.
- FRI promotes over 190 local businesses in our on-line business directory.
- FRI benefited from over \$15,000 in pro bono professional consulting services

Program Highlights

COMMUNICATION

Goal

Communicate vital information regarding strategic progress and access to quality programs and/or services.

Outcomes

- 2,500 people received the 2x per month FRI digital newsletter — the FRI NewsFlash.
- 18,000 households received two editions of the FRIdays news magazine in April and September 2019. 50 apartment complexes received magazines left in property office, mail and/or laundry rooms. Annually, FRI provides a Resource Directory in our magazine as a community service.
- FRI continues to update and refresh its Web site making it more “user friendly” and promoting and marketing our area businesses.
- FRI has a strong and strengthened presence on Facebook and Instagram.
- 37 neighborhoods received timely communications from the City of Dallas regarding City sponsored services, events, and community opportunities throughout the year.
- Residents living in Far East Dallas receive periodic communications through the NextDoor social media platform for: Forest Hills/Casa Linda, Greater Casa View, White Rock East, and White Rock Hills communities.



Program Highlights

CONNECTION

Goal

Engage community advocates in opportunities to connect and improve the community and neighborhoods in Far East Dallas.

Outcomes

- 4,430 hours of service were donated by more than 567 volunteers at a total value of \$111,193 to our neighborhoods and businesses in Far East Dallas.
- On March 2, 2019 over 226 volunteers met at Walgreens (Lakeland/Ferguson) to participate in Operation Beautification Litter Cleanup in Far East Dallas communities and parks.
 - **Underwriters:** City Credit Union and Young Chevrolet
 - **Sponsors:** State Representative Eric Johnson (District 100), Councilmembers Kevin Felder (District 7) and Mark Clayton (District 9)
 - **Partners:** Dallas Police Department, City of Dallas, Walgreens
 - **Friends:** Elliott's Hardware, Ferguson Donut, McDonald's, Raceway, and Signage Systems.
 - **Volunteers:** Representing 7 neighborhoods, 8 schools, 2 apartments, 11 businesses, 3 nonprofit service organizations, 2 faith communities, and the White Rock Hills Library.
- 3 Election Forums were held to present the candidates and their platforms to our community: District 7 Forum, Mayoral Forum, Run-off Forums for Districts 7 & 9
- 2 semi-annual FRI Community Connection Townhall meetings held, averaging 90+ community leaders and residents.
- 25 area businesses provided \$31,647 in advertising to underwrite the FRIday magazine.
- FRI continues to partner with Owenwood Farm & Neighbor Space, a resource center serving Far East Dallas. FRI services included fundraising coaching and helping to enhance partnerships to support their monthly diaper distribution serving 200 low-income families. Connecting organizations like Lone Star Credit Union and McDonald's has helped provide both financial and employment recruitment opportunities.
- FRI connected the First Grade of White Rock Hills Preparatory Uplift School with the residents of Lakeland Hills Senior Living during Halloween festivities

Program Highlights

CRIME & SAFETY

Goal

Educate and engage community leaders to increase public safety and decrease crime in Far East Dallas.

Outcomes

- Maintained a Database of FRI Community Leadership, Crime Watch/VIP & Public Safety organizations to educate leaders on crime trends and provide actionable information.
- 37 neighborhoods Crime Watch and Volunteer In Patrol organizations served by 4 quarterly special public safety programming meetings in partnership with Truett Area Crime Watch: Protecting Your Home, Scam Protection, Navigating 3-1-1, Understanding the City Public Portal
- With increased Crime Watch and Volunteer In Patrol programs, overall crime continues to decline, and FRI continues to seek funding for public safety initiatives.

Program Highlights

FINANCIAL LITERACY

Goal

Provide Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) services and financial literacy education to community residents.

Outcomes



FRI VITA services have helped support Far East Dallas families for 14 years



Lochwood Library is the second VITA site in Far East Dallas

- Because need is so great in our community, this year VITA services expanded to include an additional location so that FRI supported (2) VITA sites: First Community Church and Lochwood Library.
- FRI provided financial and staff support along with volunteer recruitment to our VITA site partners.
- 1,624 families received VITA services this year, resulting in more than an 8% increase from last year!
- A combined total of \$2,967,296 in tax return money stayed in Far East Dallas.
- FRI has a 14-year track record of providing the VITA programs and services Is the number of years correct?
- \$842,474 in earned income tax credits helped residents avoid predatory lending.
- 406 hours of free financial education was provided for VITA families.
- 2,336 volunteer hours were donated to help Far East families keep the money they earn.

Program Highlights

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Goal

Advocate for compatible, quality economic development to revitalize Far East Dallas and facilitate new opportunities with partners and investors.

Outcomes

- Construction on the \$750,000 White Rock Hills Park began this year and is expected to be completed in 2020. The Park will begin to address the recreation gap that has existed along the lower Ferguson Road corridor in Far East Dallas, for over 30 years. The Park will serve hundreds of children and their families in Far East Dallas.

- FRI helped facilitate two new housing developments this year: Ferguson Townhomes (10 townhomes, 1,600 sf, targeting middle-income families and professionals like health, school, police and fire personnel) and David Weekley's "Grove at White Rock Hills" (35 single family townhomes, 1,600 sf, gated, priced at \$425,000)

- The Circuit Trail Conservancy (The Loop) presented their preliminary plans for the Trinity Forest Spine Trail to the community in November at the White Rock Hills Library. Groundbreaking is anticipated in late 2020.

- An important contribution made to FRI in regards to economic development along the lower Ferguson Road corridor is the Urban Land Institute Technical Assistance Panel 2-day workshop. This workshop studied how the development of the green space along and adjacent to the Ash Creek Greenbelt can serve as a quality economic development generator. We look forward to learning the recommendations made by the ULI so that FRI can begin implementing them in 2020!

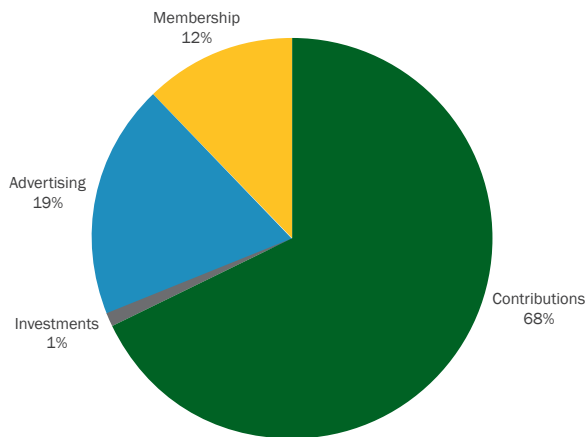

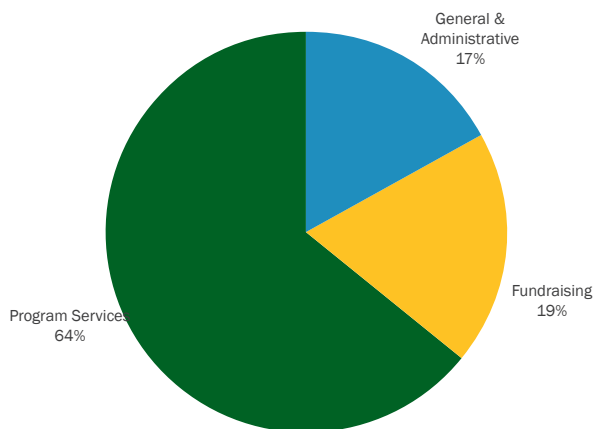

2019 REVENUE - \$173,698



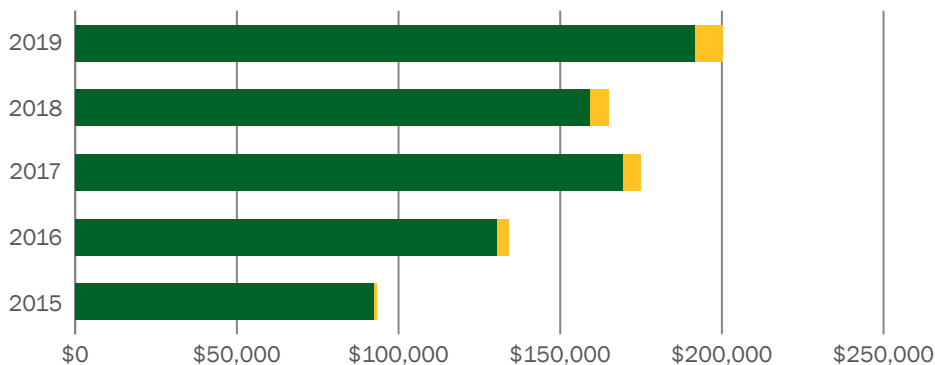
80% of FRI's support comes from its members in the form of monthly support and annual gifts.
